# 83rd Annual Meeting Recap

Macon Electric Cooperative held its 83rd Annual Membership Meeting on Tuesday, August 8, 2023. The meeting took place at the Macon County Fairground facilities. Voting was completed via drive-through from 2:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. The business meeting started at 6:15 p.m. in the Youth Center. All members who registered and voted by mail, online, or inperson, received a \$20 energy credit as well as an 85th Anniversary edition calendar. A grand prize drawing of \$100 was drawn at the business meeting and David and Janet Wear of Macon, Missouri was the winner.

The business portion of the meeting included the reports of officers, the general manager's report, voting results, and the election of three directors. Directors elected to serve a three-year term were Western Area -Ben Williams, Northwestern Area - Mary C. Almond, and Eastern Area - Jay Collins.

Along with voting for board representatives, a By-Law amendment was proposed. The bylaw amendment question "Should the current bylaw language remain the same" passed meaning the current by-law language will remain as is and the nominating committee will NOT be reinstated as requested by the membership at last year's meeting.
